## National Poetry Month spreads the word in uncommon ways

(Toronto) — This April, The League of Canadian Poets (<u>www.poets.ca</u>) will present its first-ever baker's dozen, a list of 13 must-read Canadian poetry books made available to booksellers across the country as a guide to readers exploring Canadian poetry.

"The baker's dozen is meant as a starting place from which we can promote Canadian poets and their poetry," commented Edita Page, Executive Director of the League of Canadian Poets. "It's important to the League to communicate the richness and depth of poetic talent in this country. We're the envy of much of the literary world."

The English list, as well as an equivalent list of French-language titles, is featured on National Poetry Month posters distributed across the country. Each book is currently in print and will be available for sale in April 2004. The public will be encouraged to comment on the list and to talk about their favourite Canadian titles by visiting a special message board on the League's web site at <a href="https://www.poets.ca">www.poets.ca</a>.
