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
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Our year in review

From the desk of Nic Brewer, Interim Executive Director

2023 has been another full year for the League, and we've been grateful to have the support of our members, staff, and volunteers to get us through it. It was my first full year in the role of Interim Executive Director, and I've learned so much and appreciated every opportunity the role has presented with me - but I am certainly excited to have our fearless leader Lesley Fletcher returning in early 2024! Although it was no particular milestone. I celebrated 8 years with the League this November. and it's been a privilege to be part of the innovation, growth, and creativity this organization brings to Canadian arts, from my earliest days as a part-time Administrative and Communications Co-ordinator to today, being Interim Executive Director.

This past fall, we held the first Board retreat for our new, smaller Board, a dedicated team of volunteers who were up for the adventure of travelling to Ontario, staying in one big house together, and learning the finer details of the League's new governance structure and opportunities over the course of a weekend in late September. As well, your leadership team spent hours working to develop a new strategic plan to carry

Microgrants

Through careful fiscal planning, and with the continued support of the Canada Council for the Arts, the Ontario Arts Council, the Toronto Arts Council, and our donors, as well as additional support this year from the Toronto Arts Foundation, we were grateful to provide poets with more than \$100,000 this year through our various microgrant streams. Our microgrants include honorarium and travel support for events, funding for workshops and oneon-one poetry consultations, and mentorship pairs.

National Poetry Month

National Poetry Month 2023 was celebrated all across Canada, with more than 300 orders placed for free posters and bookmarks to mark the occasion. More than 1,000 posters and 17,000 bookmarks were distributed to event organizers, schools, libraries, and more! Poem in Your Pocket Day was celebrated on April 26, 2023, with 15 poems selected for the occasion and designed into beautiful

postcards by Megan Fildes.





Access Copyright

Like many organizations and individuals in our sector, we were saddened earlier this year at Access Copyright's announcement of layoffs and downsizing. In August 2023, the League was one of many cultural organizations to sign a letter to the federal government pushing the urgent need for more attention to our sector's economic concerns.

Bill Arnott's Beat

Airwaves & Verse



I met a poet who's a clown. Seriously. I'd never met a real clown before. Sure, class clowns, but they rarely got to hit their creative stride, shows invariably cut short by a trip to the principal's office, the yank of a hook wielded by some humour quashing teacher – you know the type – hit 'em with a cream pie or squirting flower, they simply don't appreciate the subtleties of performance art.

Turns out Vancouver's RC Weslowski, award winning spoken-word poet, is a professionally trained clown. And I admit, when I entered the Vancouver radio station for a quest spot on his Wax Poetic show, I was expecting (hoping?) he'd be adorned in a foam-ball nose and enormous red shoes. I was even ready with an opening salvo. (Hey, it takes a big fella' to fill those shoes!) In fact, I'd have settled for angry Joe Pesci. (What, you think I'm a clown?!) As you can see, I'd done my homework. But it wasn't to be. Not like that, anyway. If the radio-host/slam-poet extraordinaire was wearing make-up, it was subtle. No white pancake. No droopy mouth. There may've been a little something to help his cheekbones pop above the beard, but it was discrete.

When asked to do something like this, I assume the actual guest cancelled, as well as the backup guest. But no. This had been scheduled for a while. I knew the program. Enjoyed it online, its podcasts, and when I'm near an actual radio. RC has created a very special show on Vancouver Co-op Radio, showcasing a range

of poets, laureates and newbies alike. Frequently co-hosted by Lucia Misch, Kevin Spenst, and others, it's now part of an established community of writers and performance poets, sharing the written word on the airwaves, adding an auditory element one can only usually get at live readings.

As a writer I enjoy sharing my work in my voice, literally, the most rudimentary of multimedia deliveries. I can add the cadence I intended. Put the emPHAsis on the right sylLAble as comic Mike Myers once said. But the reader in me also enjoys absorbing other writers' work in my own manner, a tempo that enables me to savour, ingest at a comfortable pace, take the time to figure out what's being said, or alluded to.

I appreciate writers wanting, needing, to read their own words, ensuring others won't ruin their work. That's where the performance medium comes into play. Which is what Weslowski and team bring in spades. RC, a skilled voiceover expert, facilitator and actor, has dominated international slam poetry events, including winning the Golden Beret. I knew about Green Berets from the movies, and asked RC if he knew how to kill a guy with his thumb. Turns out he does. Not because of his Golden Beret but rather from his work as a corporate workshop facilitator. I believe. That one I

may've made up.


But the interview went well. RC ensured that it did. Same as co-host Lucia Misch. They're good at what they do, along with everyone else who's helped produce this radio show. I felt privileged to experience it firsthand. To share space with experts. Humbled, in fact. Every poet, performer or not, should be thankful for programs like Wax Poetic, artists going above and beyond to create shared output in a convenient, accessible format. We owe this program, this crew, and this clown, our gratitude.

Review: *Another Open Door* by Ann Elizabeth Carson

Another Open Door

Aeolus House, 2023 64 pages, \$20.00 ISBN: 978-1-987872-56-9

Another Open Door is an inspiring melange of poetry, prose, music and artwork. As if to say, "Please enter without knocking," the cov-

er photo features Ann's clay sculpture that suggests a listening ear or a shell's portal. In each of the book's three sections the clay takes on a new shape: In "Archival River," it appears to contain a riverbed. "In Lifelines" two abstract figures embrace each other with what looks like a stone between them. "For the Time Being" showcases two figures moving apart, then on the last page they come together to dance. Complementing our multimedia experience, some texts contain links and OR codes to videos and music composed by Jana Skarecky.

Opening the door to the first section, "Archival River," we are introduced to the author's "Then and Now" timeless friendship with her "Artemis sister," whom she deeply misses. In "Eating Memories" we savour Ann's childhood as she takes out her Swiss Army knife to cut off a remnant sliver of an ice block carved from Monhegan Island Pond. A passionate environmentalist, she vents her rage in this section, as she wonders "how my species of animal/so wildly, unpredictably and continuously creative/is still destroying the

world/creature by creature." In "Bitter Sweet," her poignant gratitude for her blessings includes the view of the trees outside her window, "their branches like a forest of paintbrushes tracing possibilities."

Section 2 of this rich hybrid book welcomes the reader through the portal of the poet's "awakening." Her prose essay "Because of a Question" describes how she became a feminist. Born in 1929, "the year women officially became persons in Canada," she guides us through the decades when "normal" women were expected to give up their careers upon marriage to become housewives, mothers, and satellites to their husbands. Later, as a single parent forced to support four children after a divorce from her alcoholic husband, she grows into an independent selfhood that finds strength and validation as a psychotherapist, poet, author and artist. Currently in her 90s and having to cope with the physical problems, loneliness, isolation and ageism afflicting the elderly, it is her love of nature and creativity that sustains her.

Section 3, "For the Time Being," opens with an inventory of things the poet has lost, among them: "old friends, agile fingers, treble notes." This is followed by a paean for something found: "children scuffling though fallen leaves" as her own feet "shuffle/kick through rusty oak,/

sun-yellow ash." The imaginative poem "Once Upon a Far" misses a time when physical wellbeing wasn't a fairy-tale, but in "Queen Ann" her refreshing sense of humour endears us as she settles on the "cushioned throne" of her walker.

Summing up her life in a haiku: "long life in a book/the pages turn revealing/more gaps than story," this admirable poet bravely faces the fact that soon no more doors will open. As an elder myself facing many of the same challenges, I admire her refusal to indulge in self-pity. Instead, she celebrates "The Importance of Small." Grateful for "day-to-day wonders," she wakes up "amazed that I'm still here/to enjoy the first earth-stirrings, and a flash of birdwing."

Donna Langevin's latest of six poetry collections include *Timed Radiance* (Aeolus House, 2022) and Brimming (Piquant Press, 2019). She won second prize in the 2014 GritLIT contest and first prize in the Banister Anthology competition, 2019, and in the Ontario Poetry Society Pandemic Poem contest, 2020. *A Story for Sadie* was published by Piquant Press in 2023.
